I am 26 years old and I worked as an English Instructor at a hospitality management school back in Indonesia, I also worked as Project Coordinator for SOLS 24/7 Malaysia, an NGO that focuses on providing skills to those who are financially vulnerable. I majored in International Relations, specializing in security studies.

What is your current level in French, and what level would do you aim to have?

I currently have a B2 level and aim to have a C1 level.

Why did you want to come to France?

It was more of a gradual decision, seeing how I progress professionally and personally, since I decided to explore the NGO field.

Why did you choose this program and why would you recommend this program to others?
